

Summary

The sermon focuses on the concept of rescue in Exodus 13-14, where God leads the Israelites out of Egypt. The pastor emphasizes that God sometimes takes people on longer routes in life because He loves them and knows what's best. The Israelites' journey included taking Joseph's bones, being led by God through pillars of cloud and fire, and facing a seemingly impossible situation between Pharaoh's army and the Red Sea.

What does it mean to you that 'God always knows which way is best'?

This week, commit to spending dedicated daily time with God in prayer and Bible reading. Start by setting aside at least 15 minutes each day to seek His guidance and presence, even if it means adjusting your schedule or waking up earlier.
