Summary

4. How has your understanding of the church as the 'body of Christ' changed or deepened after hearing this message?

5. Pastor Mike emphasized that 'we need one another.' Can you share a time when another church member met a need in your life that you couldn't have met yourself?

6. What specific role or gift do you believe God has given you to contribute to the body of Christ? How are you currently using it?

Life Application

This week, identify one specific way you can demonstrate your interdependence with other church members. This might mean reaching out to someone with a different gift than yours for help with a challenge you're facing, offering your unique abilities to serve someone else in the body, or simply acknowledging your need for others by asking for prayer or support. Then, look for one opportunity outside the church to demonstrate Christ-like attitudes and behaviors that might open a door for gospel conversations.
