Summary

In this sermon from the 'Exiled' series on First Peter, the pastor explores what it means to be stewards of God's gifts while living as exiles in the world. Using First Peter 4, he examines both the attitudes and actions that characterize faithful stewardship. The message emphasizes that as Christians, we are called to have attitudes of commitment, sober-mindedness, and judgment (self-evaluation), while demonstrating actions of self-control, prayer, love, hospitality, and service. The pastor reminds the congregation that God has given each believer specific gifts to use for the benefit of others and the kingdom.

Questions

- 5. The pastor discusses how we create the environment we find ourselves in through our repeated habits and attitudes. How have you seen this play out in your own relationships?
- 6. What practical steps could you take to show more hospitality in your life? What barriers prevent you from being more hospitable?

Life Application

This week, take time to identify one gift God has given you that you may not be fully utilizing for His kingdom. Pray about how you might steward this gift more faithfully. Then, take one concrete step toward using this gift to serve others. This could mean volunteering in a ministry that aligns with your gifting, reaching out to a neighbor in hospitality, or finding a new way to love and serve those in your immediate circle. Remember that we are called to be stewards who will one day give an account for how we've used what God has entrusted to us.
