# **Summary**

In this sermon, Pastor Paul explores the concept of submission within the church community, drawing primarily from Ephesians 5:21 - "Submit to one another out of reverence for Christ." He explains that biblical submission is not about control or manipulation, but rather a voluntary commitment to line up under authority for a greater purpose. Unlike the world's negative view of submission, Christian submission is unique because it's voluntary and focused on commitment rather than control, following Jesus's example of submitting to the Father's will.

The pastor emphasizes that true submission is only possible when believers are filled with the Holy Spirit, and the motivation for submission should be reverence for Christ and His sacrifice. He illustrates how submission leads to church growth through biblical examples and personal stories, challenging the congregation to examine whether they're willing to set aside their own desires and past experiences to align with God's greater vision. The sermon concludes by describing how a healthy church is characterized by people who embody Christ-like submission - giving up their seats, asking what others prefer, serving in the shadows, and prioritizing others' needs above their own.

### **Intro Prayer**

Heavenly Father, as we gather to discuss the concept of submission, we ask that You would open our hearts to Your truth. Help us to see submission through Your eyes rather than through the lens of our past experiences or the world's perspective. ### **Questions**

- 3. In what areas of your life do you find it most difficult to practice submission? Why do you think that is?
- 4. How does Jesus model submission in His relationship with the Father? What can we learn from His example?
- 5. The sermon states that the Holy Spirit is the means of submission. How does being filled with the Spirit enable us to submit to one another?
- 6. The pastor asks, "Will you allow your past to define what could be possible today?" How might past experiences with authority affect our ability to practice healthy submission?
- 7. What are some practical ways we can practice submission in our church community? How might this impact church growth?
- 8. How does submitting to one another actually reflect the character of Christ to the world around us?

# Life Application

This week, identify one relationship or situation where you tend to insist on your own way or preferences. Make a conscious decision to practice submission by asking what the other person thinks, wants, or prefers before expressing your own opinion. When you feel resistance rising within you, pause and remember Christ's example of submission. Journal about your experience - what was challenging about it? What did you learn? How did it affect the relationship? Come prepared next week to share how this exercise impacted your understanding of Christ-like submission.
