Summary

This sermon explores the story of the paralyzed man lowered through the roof in Mark 2:1-12, emphasizing that while everyone remembers the dramatic roof breakthrough, the greater miracle was the spiritual breakthrough in the man's heart. Pastor Mike uses this narrative to teach about God's desire to forgive sins, explaining that forgiveness comes through faith in Jesus Christ alone, not through works or religious acts. He shares a powerful personal story about leading an 85-year-old woman named Laura to salvation, illustrating that no sin is too great for God's forgiveness. The message concludes with a call for both salvation for non-believers and confession of unconfessed sin for believers, emphasizing that God wants to free everyone from the burden of guilt and shame.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, as we gather together to study Your Word, we ask that You would open our hearts and minds to what You want to teach us today. Questions

- 1. What stands out to you most about the faith and determination of the four friends who brought the paralyzed man to Jesus?
- 2. Why do you think Jesus chose to address the man's spiritual need (forgiveness of sins) before his physical need (paralysis)?
- 3. How did the religious leaders react to Jesus' declaration of forgiveness, and what does this reveal about their understanding of who Jesus was?
- 4. Pastor Mike mentioned that we often categorize sins as 'bad' and 'not so bad.' How does this false categorization affect our understanding of God's forgiveness?

- 5. What was significant about Jesus proving His authority to forgive sins by performing the physical healing?
- 6. How does the story of Laura (the 85-year-old woman) challenge our assumptions about who can be forgiven and when it's 'too late'?
- 7. What are some reasons people might carry unconfessed sin in their lives, even as believers?
- 8. How should the truth that 'Jesus is the same yesterday, today, and forever' impact our expectations of what God can do in our lives today?

Life Application

This week, take time for honest self-examination. If you have never surrendered your life to Christ, consider making that decision. If you are a believer, ask God to reveal any unconfessed sin in your life and bring it before Him in prayer. Additionally, look for opportunities to be like the four friends - helping someone in your life get closer to Jesus through your faith, persistence, and care.
