Summary

This sermon explores the story of Joseph, the earthly father of Jesus, as found in Matthew 1:18-25. The pastor presents Joseph as the first natural-born disciple of Jesus Christ in Matthew's Gospel. When Joseph discovers Mary is pregnant, he faces three options: have her stoned according to the law, divorce her quietly, or marry her as God commands through an angel. The sermon emphasizes that Joseph's decision to take Mary as his wife wasn't based on pity or obligation, but because he believed Jesus was the Messiah who came to save people from their sins. This represents a radical transformation for Joseph, who was accustomed to God appearing as powerful forces like storms and fire in the Old Testament, not as a vulnerable baby. The story demonstrates how encountering Jesus Christ leads to discipleship - a radical internal transformation involving new priorities, new identity, and new mercy. Joseph's response shows immediate obedience and action, making him a model disciple who believed and behaved as if Jesus was truly the Messiah.

Intro Prayer

Questions

- 1. Joseph had three options when he discovered Mary was pregnant. What do you think was going through his mind during this difficult time?
- 2. The sermon mentions that Joseph was 'a man of the law' but needed to become 'a man of God.' What's the difference between following rules and following God?

- 3. How do you think Joseph's understanding of God changed when he learned that God was coming as a baby rather than as a storm, fire, or powerful force?
- 4. Joseph is described as the first disciple in Matthew's Gospel because he both believed and behaved as if Jesus was the Messiah. How do we sometimes struggle with the gap between believing and behaving?
- 5. The angel told Joseph 'do not be afraid' not of the angel, but of doing the right thing. What are some situations where we might be afraid to do what God is asking of us?
- 6. Joseph immediately took action after his encounter with God. Why do you think some people delay or hesitate when they sense God leading them?
- 7. The sermon defines discipleship as 'radical internal transformation with a new priority, new identity, and new mercy.' Which of these three areas do you feel God is working on most in your life right now?
- 8. Joseph's story shows that God sometimes gives us choices rather than forcing us to obey. How does this understanding of God's character affect your relationship with Him?

Life Application

This week, identify one area where you sense God is asking you to step out in faith or obedience, even if it feels uncomfortable or costly. Like Joseph, choose to do what God wants rather than what seems easiest or most convenient. Take one concrete action step this week that demonstrates you believe Jesus is who He says He is.
