

Summary

This sermon from Mark chapter 1 explores the powerful ministry of Jesus Christ, beginning with his preaching ministry and the calling of his first disciples. The message focuses on four key demonstrations of Jesus' strength and authority: his authoritative teaching in the synagogue, his healing of Peter's mother-in-law, his casting out of demons, and his compassionate healing of a leper. Through these accounts, the sermon emphasizes that Jesus' words carry divine authority and his works demonstrate supernatural power. The pastor challenges the congregation to consider how strong their faith in Jesus truly is, reminding them that no problem is too small for Jesus' attention and no person is unworthy of his love and healing touch. The sermon concludes with an invitation for believers to pray for increased faith, recognizing that there is always room to grow in trusting Jesus more deeply.

Intro Prayer

Questions

- How does Jesus' teaching style differ from other religious teachers of his time, and what does this reveal about his identity?
- The demons immediately recognized Jesus as 'the Holy One of God.' What does this tell us about spiritual warfare and Jesus' authority over evil?
- Why do you think Jesus chose to heal Peter's mother-in-law's fever when he had been dealing with much more dramatic spiritual battles that day?
- What significance do you see in Jesus touching the leper before healing him, when he could have healed from a distance?
- The pastor mentioned that 'when you read the Bible, the Bible reads you.' What has been your experience with God's Word having authority in your life?
- How do you typically respond when you have what you consider 'small problems' - do you bring them to God or try to handle them yourself?
- The leper had to overcome shame and social rejection to approach Jesus. What barriers might prevent people today from coming to Jesus?
- The disciples prayed 'increase our faith' after witnessing Jesus' powerful works. In what areas of your life do you need increased faith in Jesus' strength and authority?

Life Application

This week, identify one 'small problem' in your life that you've been trying to handle on your own. Commit to bringing it to Jesus in prayer each day, trusting in his authority and power to work in that situation. Additionally, spend time daily reading through the Gospel of Mark, asking God to increase your faith as you witness Jesus' strength and compassion.
